

## Catch Up Premium Plan 2020/21

## Introduction: what is the Catch Up Premium?

Children and young people across the country have experienced unprecedented disruption to their education as a result of Covid-19.

The government has introduced a national programme of £1 billion of funding to support children and young people to catch up. This includes a one-off universal £650 million catch-up premium for the 2020 to 2021 academic year to ensure that schools have the support they need to help all pupils make up for lost teaching time.

Schools' allocations are calculated on a per pupil basis: £80 for each pupil from Reception (Foundation 2) to Year 6.

As the catch-up premium has been designed to mitigate the effects of the disruption caused by Covid-19, the grant is confirmed for the 2020 to 2021 academic year only; it may be extended into 21/22.

The funding is provided in three instalments and we will draw upon the guidance outlined in the Educational Endowment Fund's Covid-19 Support for Schools guide, as advocated by the DfE, to decide upon the best way to spend this additional funding.

Schools should use this funding for specific activities to support their pupils to catch up for lost teaching over the previous months; they have the flexibility to spend their funding in the best way for their cohort and circumstances.

This document outlines the support in place at Tranmere Park to make best use of the funding.

Provision is planned fairly to target as many children as possible, with particular attention to those that may have been disadvantaged most by school closure.



Quality classroom teaching will usually meet the needs of the majority of our learners through strategies such as:

- Differentiation
- Assessment for Learning
- Behaviour Management Strategies
- Inclusive Learning Strategies

Our usual school practice is that any child working below EXS in Reading, Writing and Maths is included in intervention to enable pupils to be 'back on track' with their learning as soon as possible. Specific SEN focused interventions also run in school and are detailed upon the SENCO Provision Mapping.

The impact of Covid-19 upon pupil learning will necessitate additional interventions to ensure that the pupils who have suffered most from lockdown and school closure are provided with additional provision to allow them to 'catch-u' to their pre Covid expected levels.

In addition, additional resources will need to be bought in to allow the best quality of remote provision and to provide children with virtual resources that can be used at home if required.

Total number of pupils: 312

Total catch-up budget: £80 per pupil = £24,960
