If your child did not meet their Early Learning Goals, they will continue to progress towards these next year.

Both of the Year 1 classes have access to outdoor and indoor provision. These areas are carefully scaffolded to support learning across the curriculum.











#### **Phonics**

In Reception, the children have worked hard on their phonics. They have completed phases 2, 3 and 4 and are ready to start phase 5 in September.

The government introduced a national phonic test for all year one pupils in 2012. This takes place during the June of your child being in Year 1. (Please do not book any holidays at this time).

#### Bookbags

In EYFS your child has already started to empty their own book bag, taking out their books, homework and reading diary. This is to increase their independence and help get them ready for Year One.

#### **Year One**

- -They will record their books in their diaries themselves
- -We encourage them to let us know if there is a message in their diary for us to read
- -Supportive process clear verbal instructions
- -Please give them reminders in the morning if there is anything that they need to hand in
- -Book bags **Monday, Wednesday and Friday**
- -Home/School Diaries Communication tool We may write messages in them for

you and please feel free to record messages for us in there too.

- -Reading books will go home three times a week
- -These will be a free choice book, reading scheme book and a shared reader book






- -These are selected by the children and support our work on 'Reading for Enjoyment'

- -Please indicate in your child's home/school diary when your child has read their


book and then it will be changed.

-Spellings are given out on a Monday and tested the following Monday.


-Please ensure that your child's spelling book is in their book bag on a

Homework Examples – Year 1







# **KS1 Trips and Visits**

Autumn Term- Kirkstall Abbey- The children will have first

hand experience of handling toys from the past. The children will take part in a toys workshop and will learn about the differences between toys today and toys from years gone by.

• Spring Term- Harlow Carr- The trip will support our geography, science and art work. We will take part in the Woodland Explorers workshop and explore the woodland, looking, listening and learning about the trees around us. We will identify leaves, trees and seeds.

Linked to our local history topic. The children will learn more about Guiseley and its key places and people – Harry Ramsden and Harry Corbett.

## How you can help

- Support your child in 'sounding out' unfamiliar words and spelling common words from the word lists correctly.
- Write shopping lists/letters to a friend.
- Write a message to their new teacher at school or send a postcard.
- Enjoy story books and audio books together.
- Practise naming and sounding letters of the alphabet.
- Play simple number games (snakes and ladders etc)
- Practise balancing, running, skipping, jumping, throwing and catching.
- Encourage your child to listen carefully and carry out a range of simple instructions.
- Ask your child to explain their games/pictures etc to you.
- Practise counting objects reliably. Look at counting in twos through sorting out pairs of socks etc.
- Encourage your child to solve simple addition and subtraction problems.
- Continue to recap on digraphs (2 letters that together make 1 sound) e.g. ee, sh, th.



# How you can help – Reading and writing

The children have come so far with their reading and frequent sharing/reading of books will help to sustain their progress throughout the Summer holidays.

- Talk to your child about everything they see around them. There is so much to learn and the more they know, the easier it will be for them to understand what they read about in books.
- Set aside some time every day when you and your child read together for pleasure. This
  will teach them so many skills! They will learn how to handle and enjoy books.
   Developing a love of books will help your child to develop positive attitudes to reading.
- Daily exercise Exercise is good for our brains as well as our bodies and children will also develop strength and coordination. This develops their gross motor skills which form the basis for fine motor skills. These are the skills needed for pencil control and writing.
- Little hands also need practise to become able to use fine motor skills. As with
  most skills, practise is what matters, so encourage your children to play with jigsaw
  puzzles, playdough, threading toys, colouring books or any other activity where
  they have to use their hands. This will make it so much easier for them to write
  neatly and well when they are taught at school.
